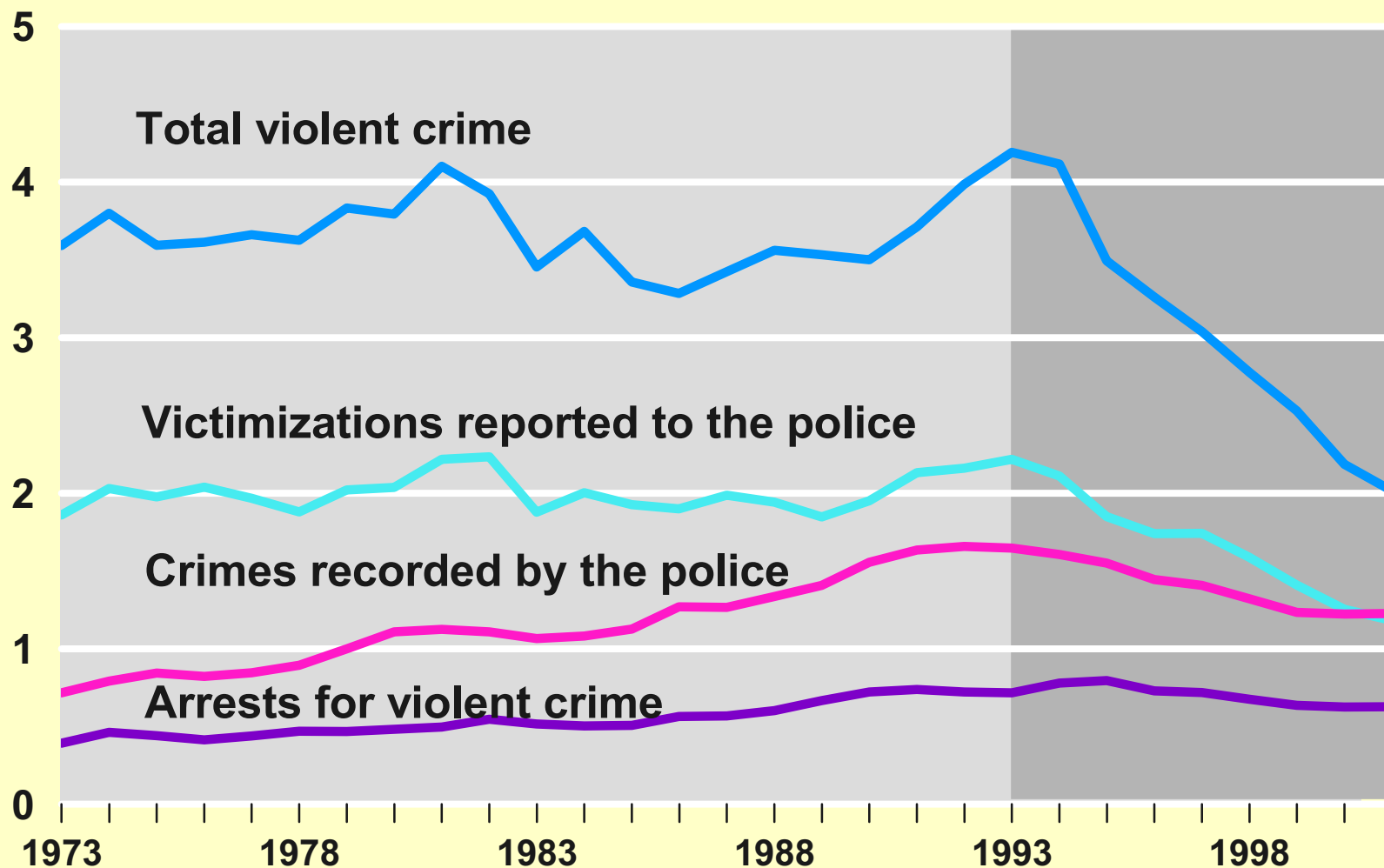


Four measures of serious violent crime

Offenses in millions

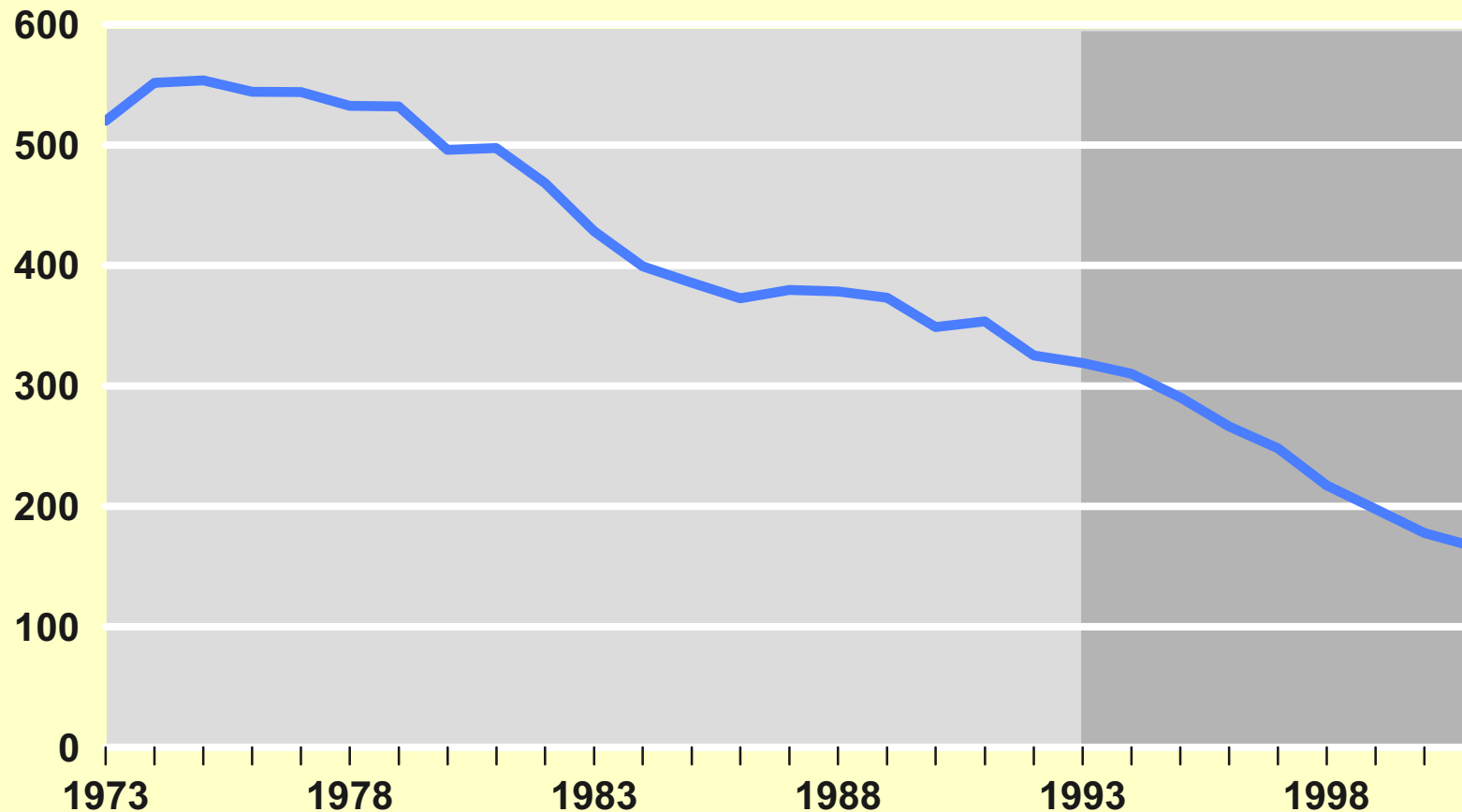

per 1,000 households

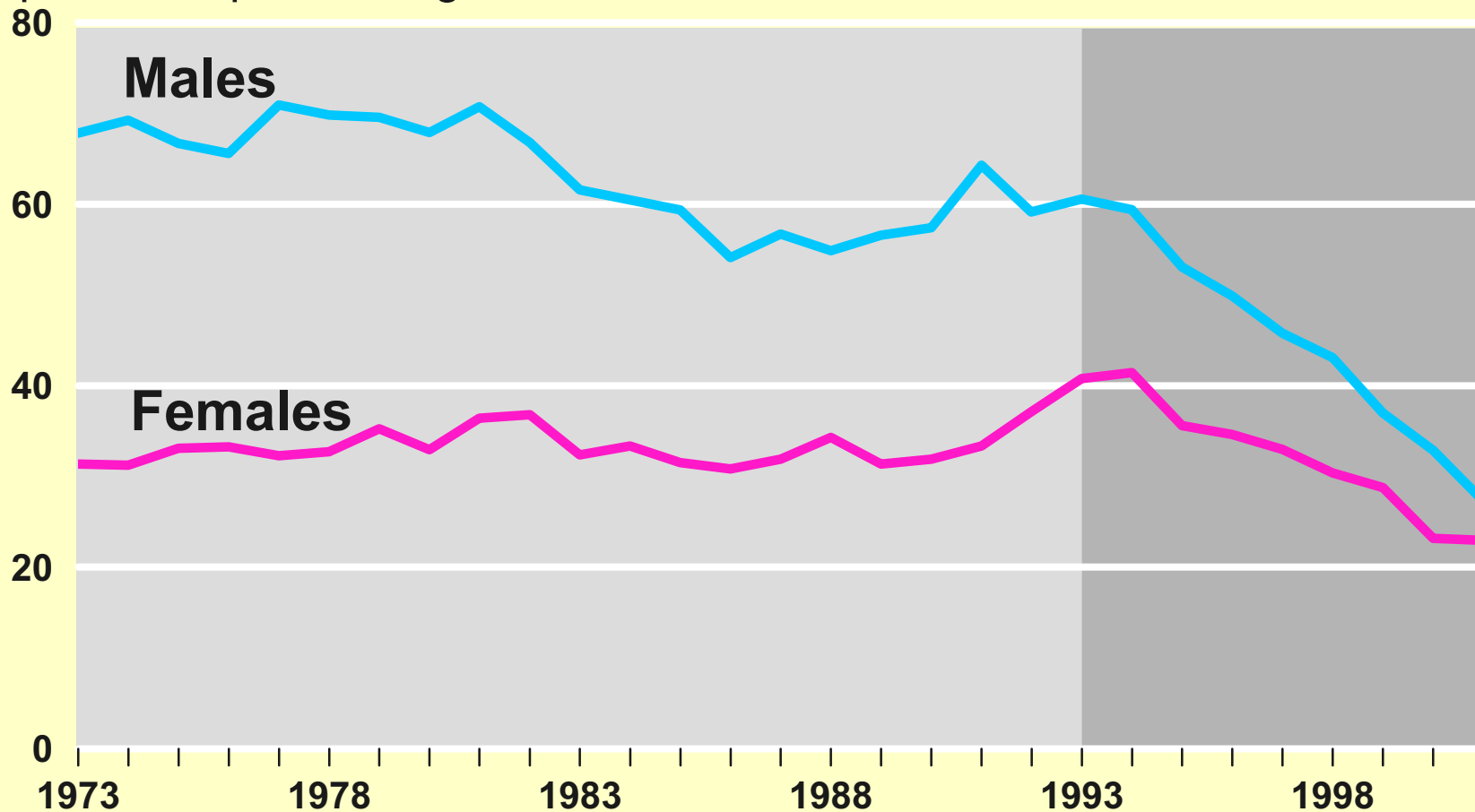

Violent crime rates by gender of victim

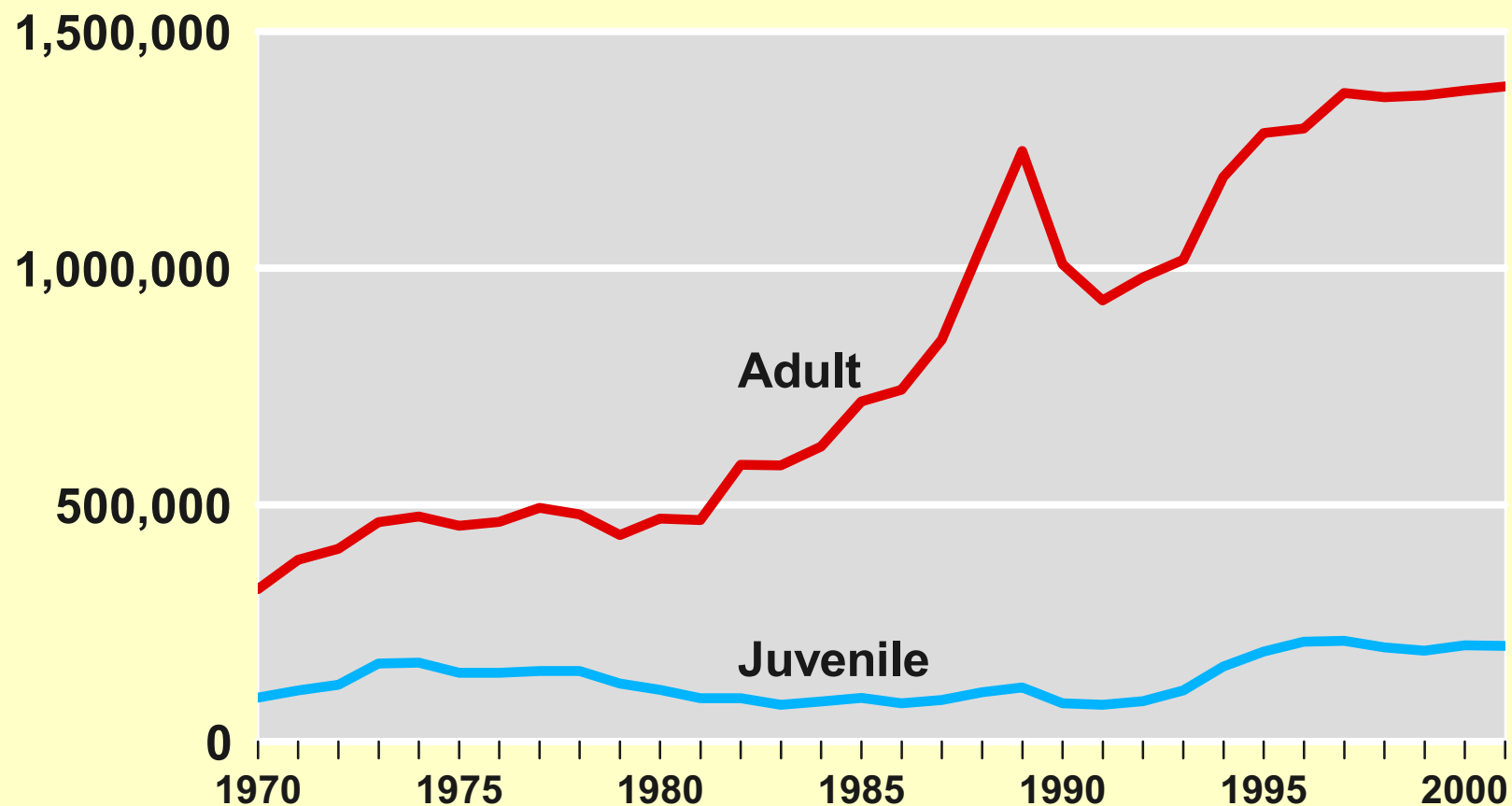
Adjusted victimization rate

Drug abuse violation arrests by age, 1970-2001

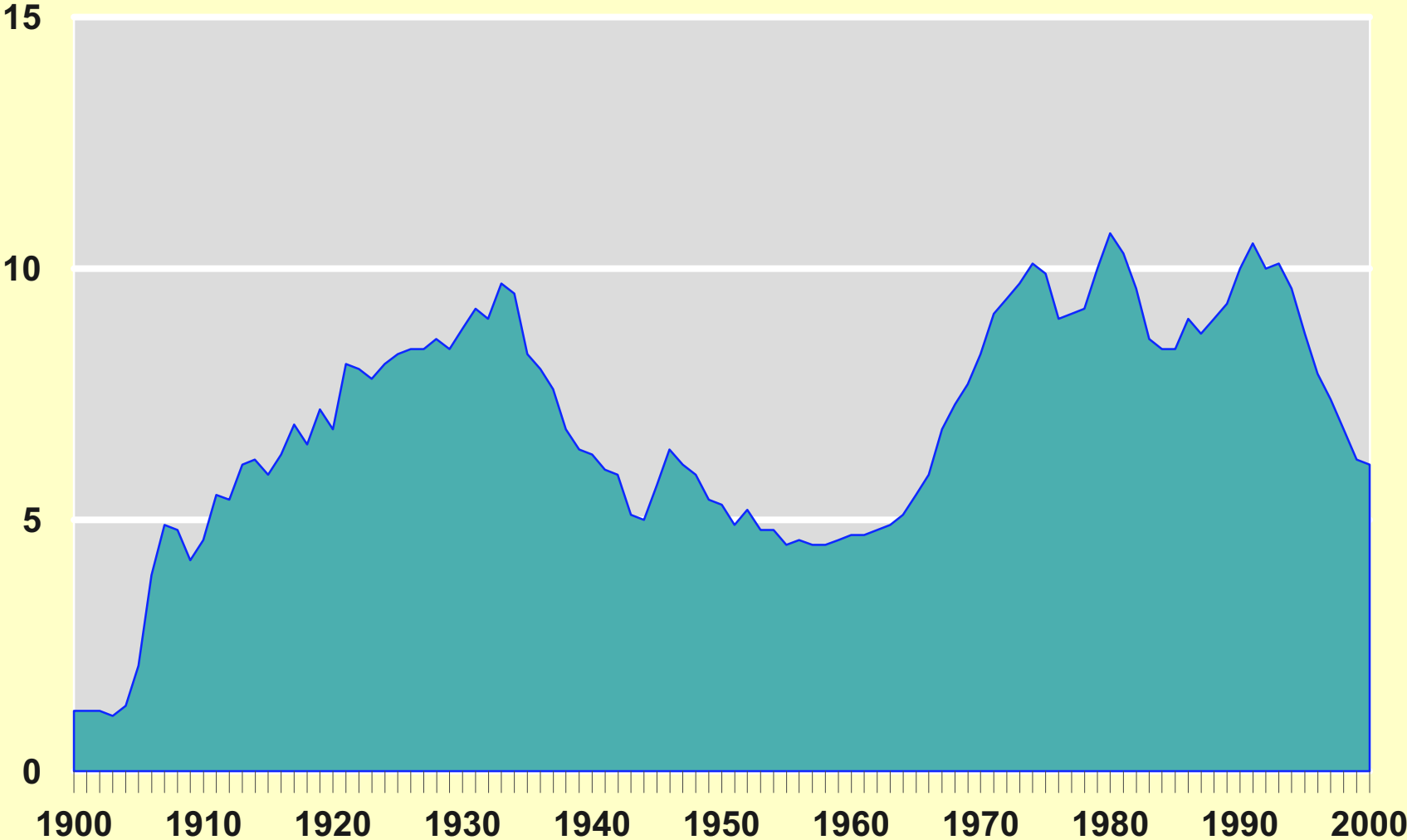

Juveniles are defined as persons under 18 years of age. Adults are defined as persons 18 years old and older.

Homicide rate, 1900-2000

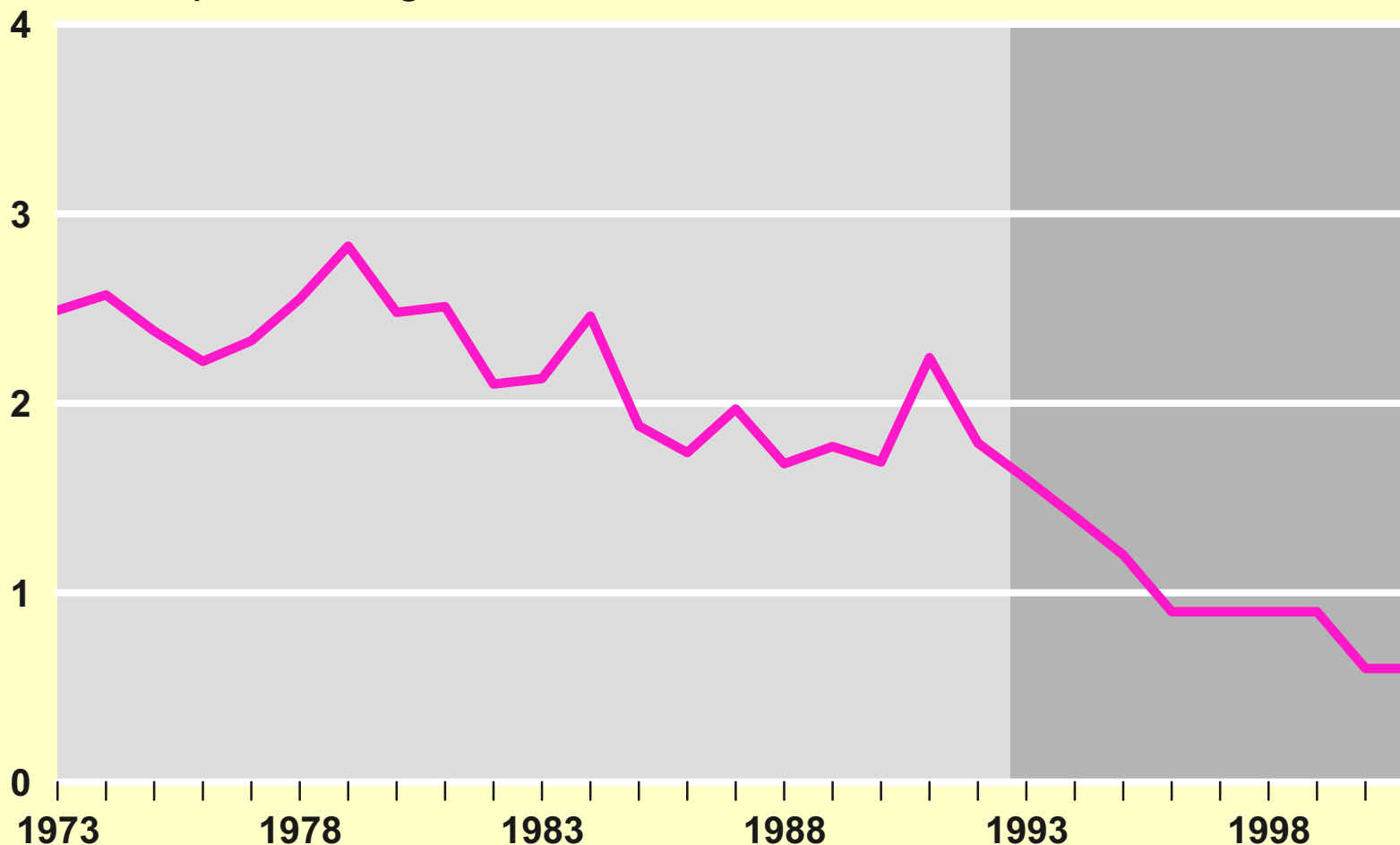
Rate per 100,000 population

per 1,000 persons age 12 and over

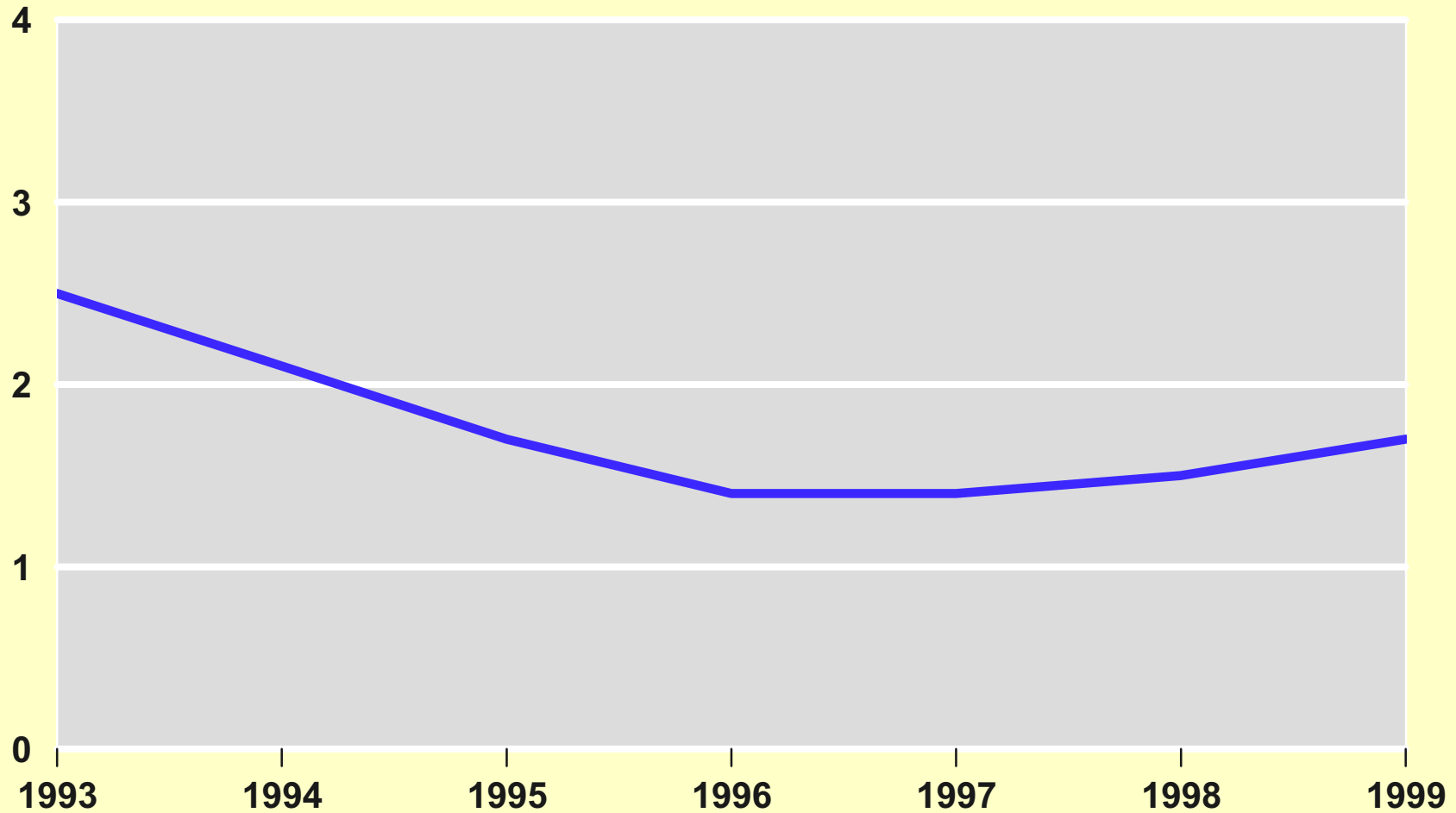

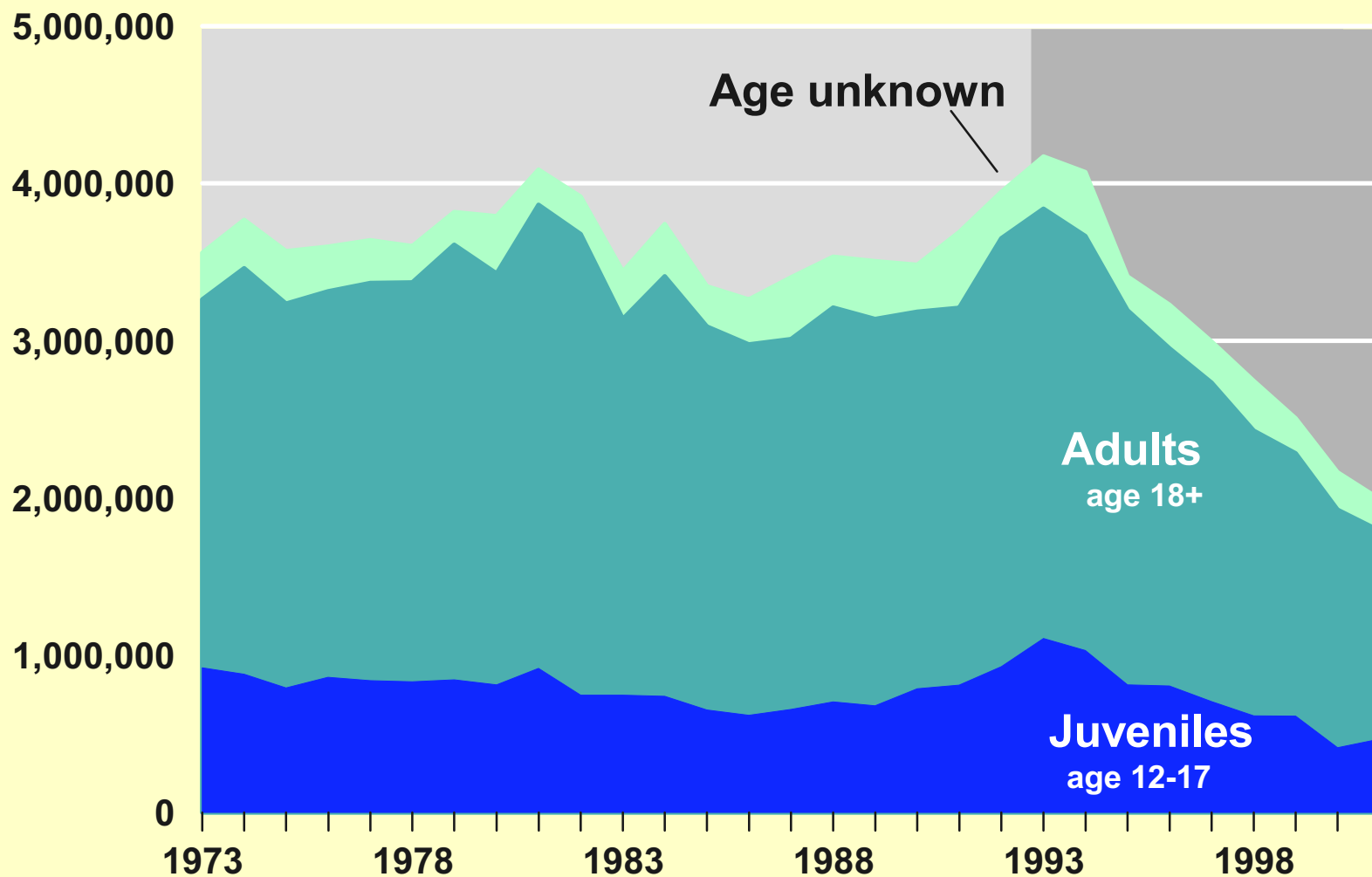
Adjusted victimization rate

Serious violent crime by perceived age of offender

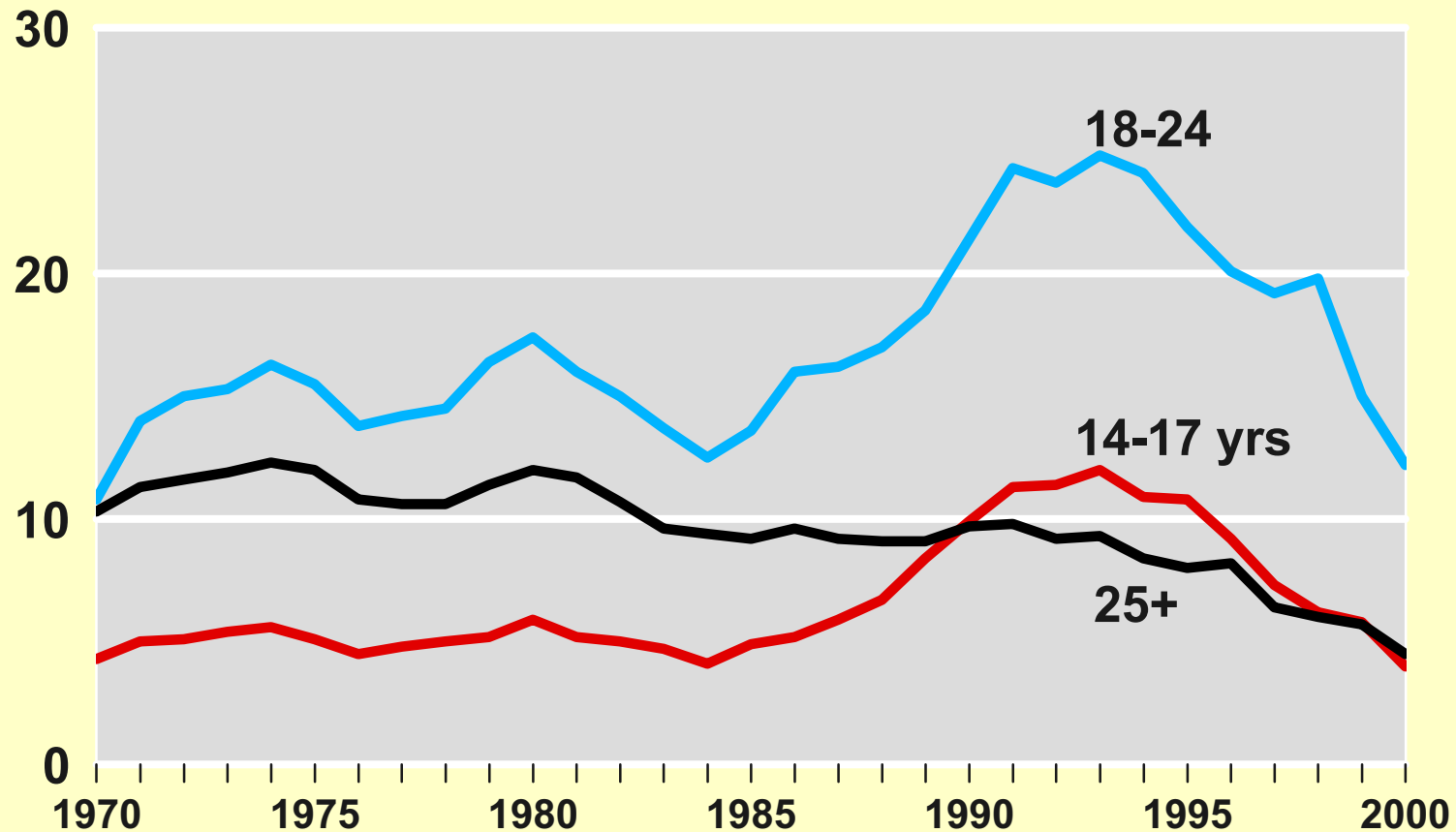

Homicide victimization rate by age, 1970-2000

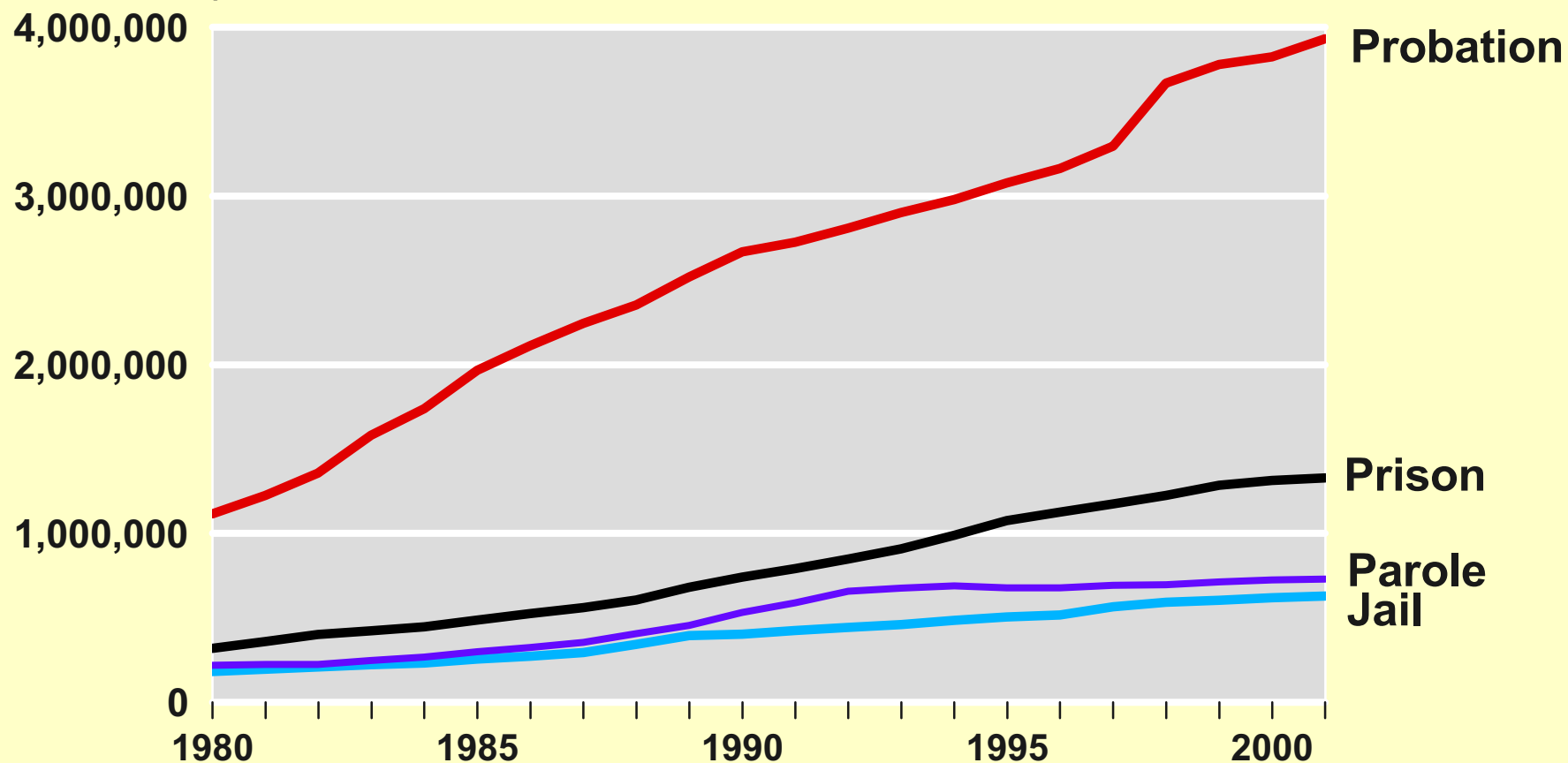

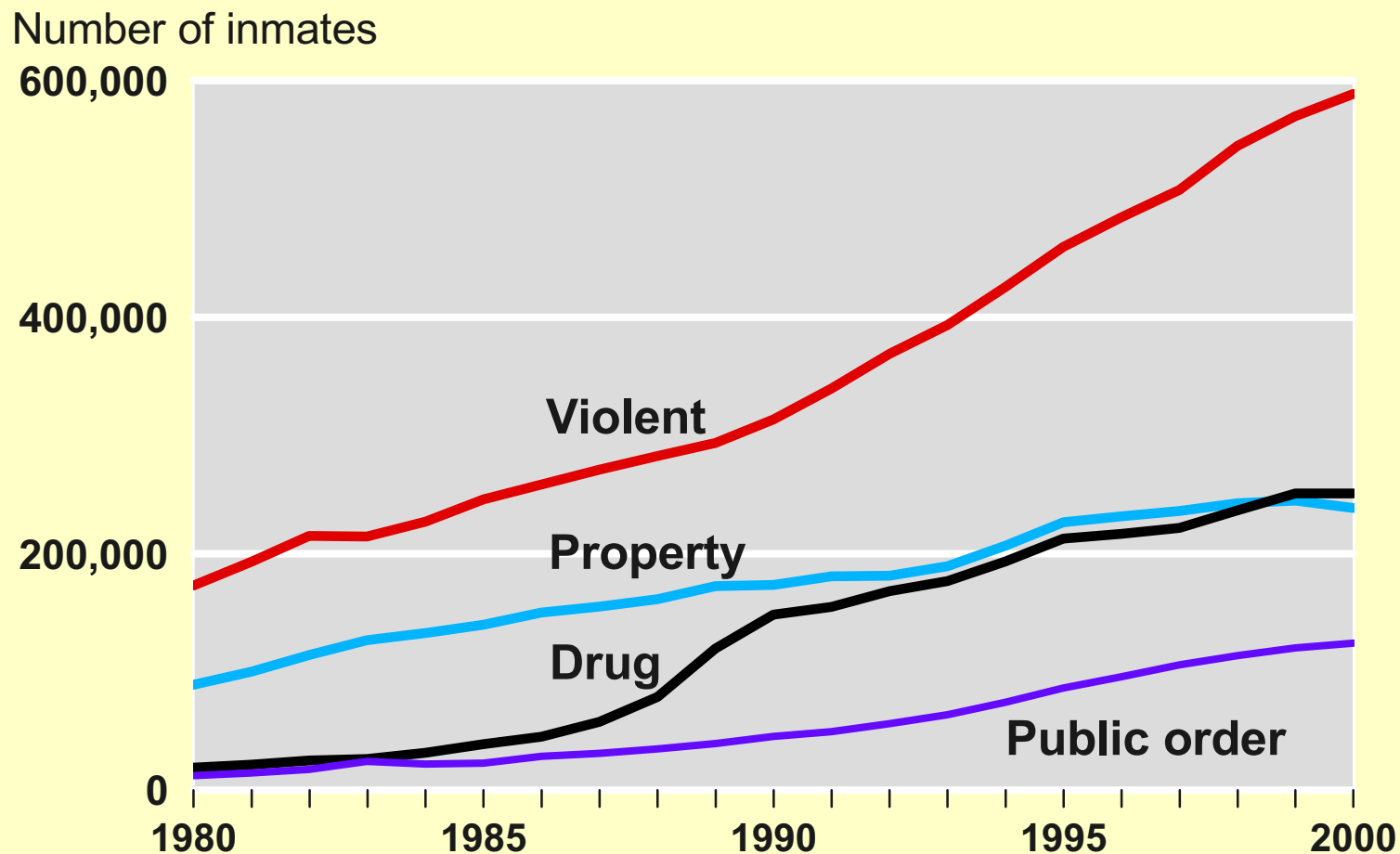
Correctional populations, 1980-2001

Number of persons



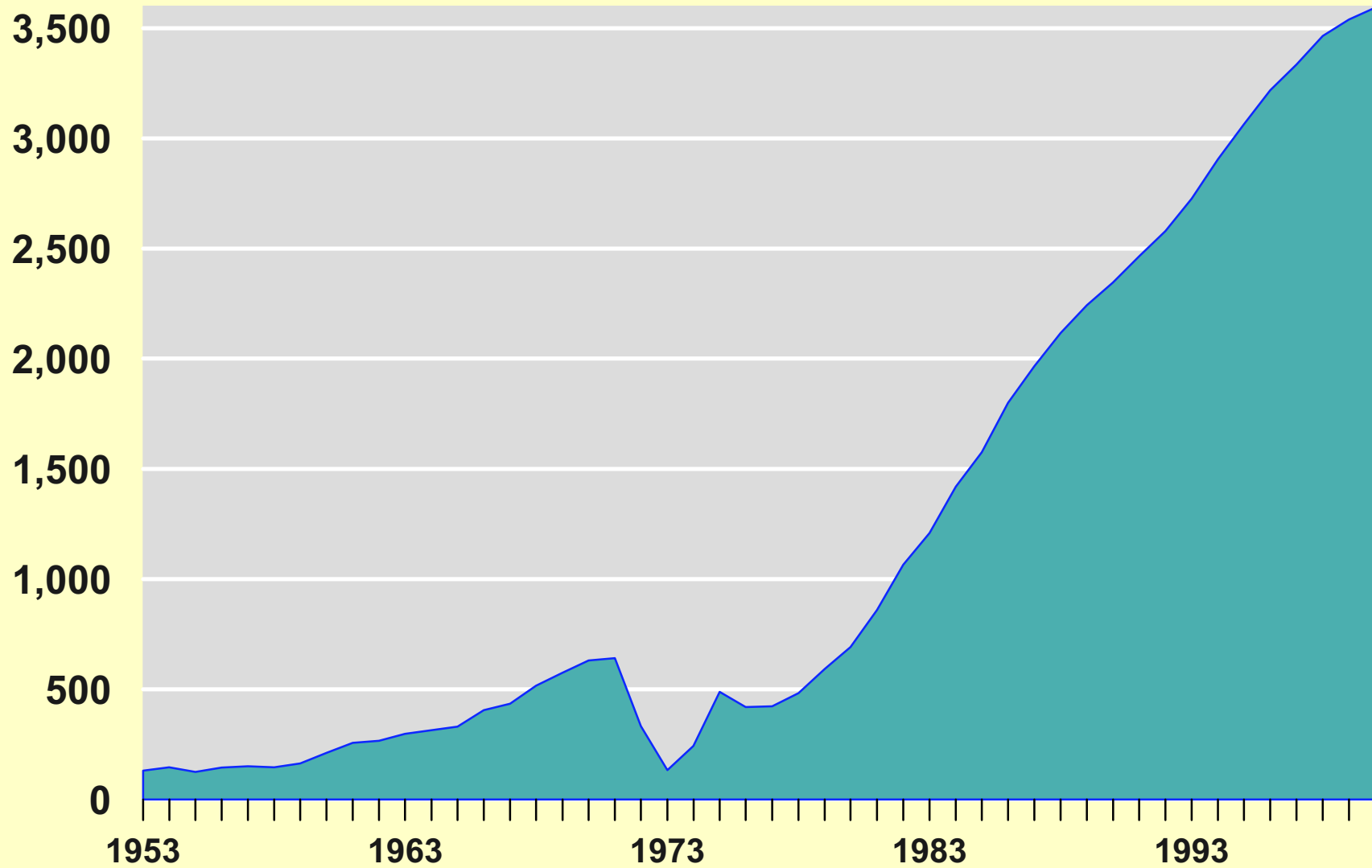

State prison population by offense type, 1980-2000



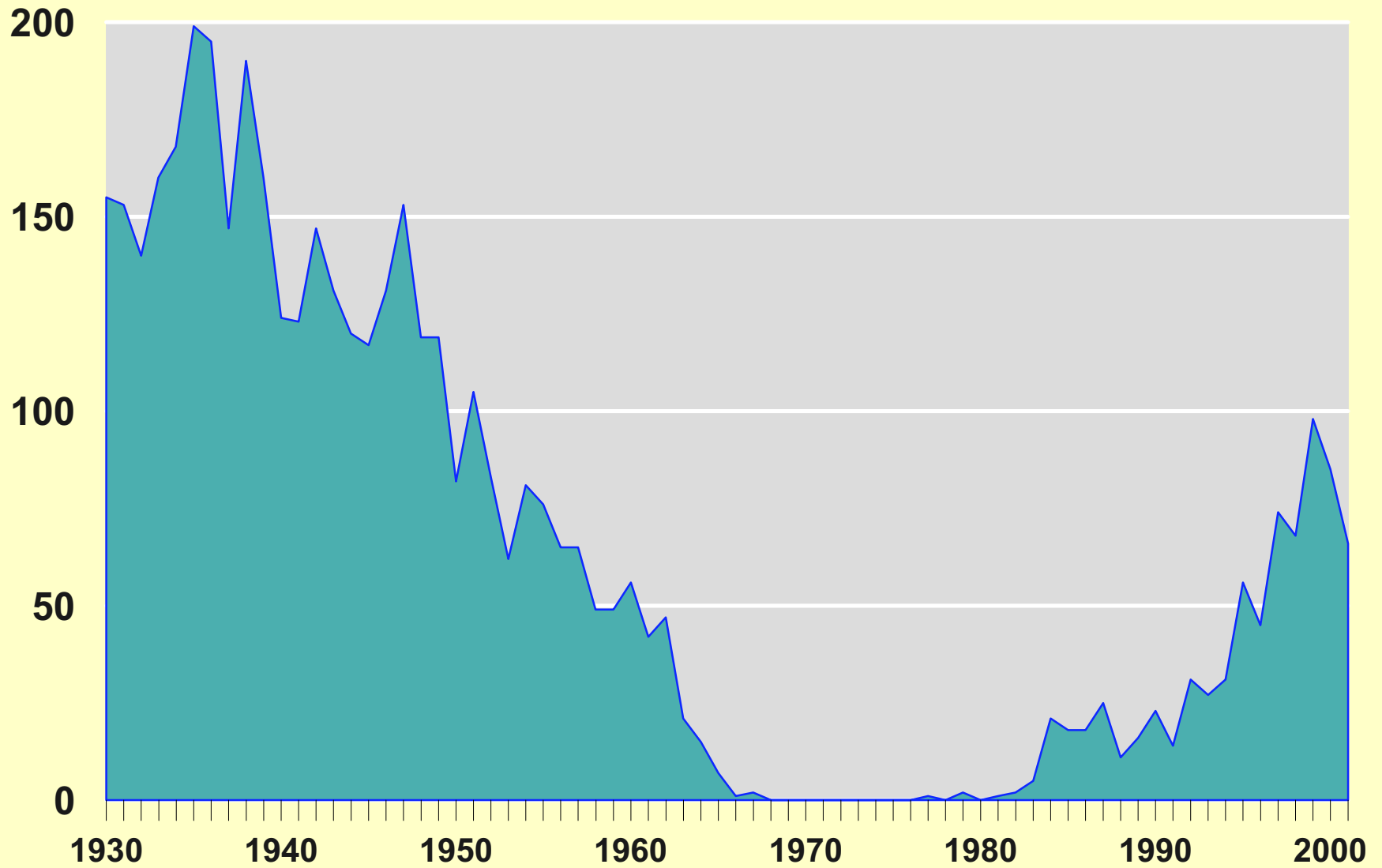

Prisoners on death row, 1953-2000



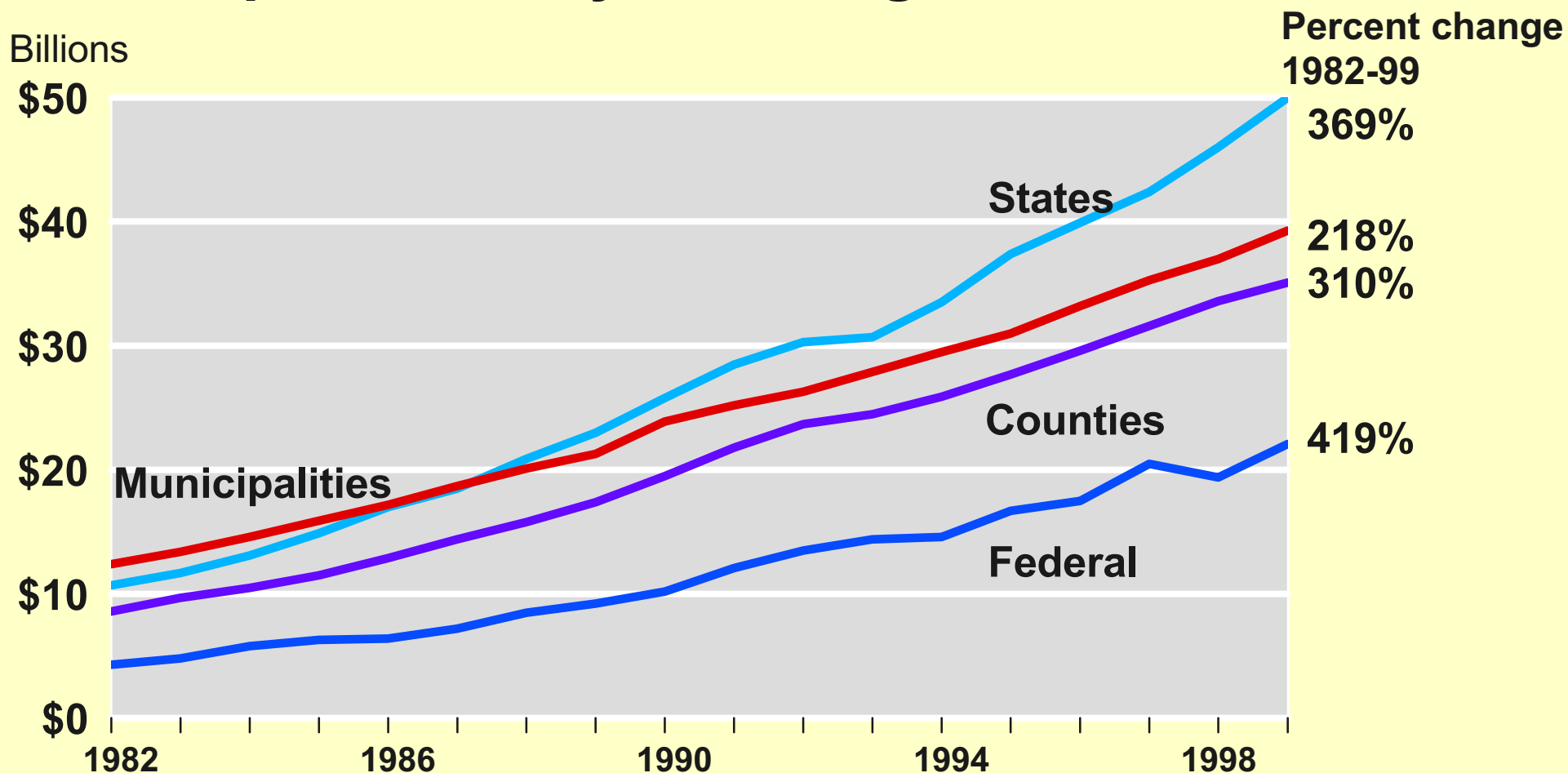
